Glenda was so generous, so ungrudging, even to the last days, calm and full of gentle inspiration despite her pain.

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I had my own battle with cancer this year and we sort hope together. One day sitting on the deck at her house with an abundance of cake, it was clear to me that our friendship was such a gift.

Glenda's email correspondence, while she was continuing with the clinical trial (retreating like a turtle, but strong, popping her head and heart out, now and again) was especially life-giving and soultouching. There was always some shared pleasure and delight in the direct experience of the 'all we need to know' through music and other arts - as she described it.

In conversation we often returned to lament and the hope of renewal from it. I was pleased to contribute in a small way to animate her work through the Chorus in the ways I know how and to hold the gift of life with her.

I had asked Glenda once, what prayer meant to her, as I grappled with the concept and practice for myself in a new way.

This was her some of her thoughtful reply:

I have never formulated words about my consistent practice of 'prayer'. In fact, I don't think I've ever said a word about it to anyone. But I do an idiosyncratic simple, faithful version of what might be called praying every day; sometimes for most of a day and night. And now, dear T, I've been sitting for a long time seeking words to describe what that is, my praying. Since you asked for responses in your last Update, I am giving you what I've come to tonight..

I recall and hold particular people - and sometimes, trees, creatures, places, Mother Earth, me - in mind with all my love. This is a kind of listening; a 'waiting upon' their wellbeing in the way that moves to the renewing promises in the King James Version of a verse in Isaiah 40. I remember these words from my childhood, when they thrilled me (though even then I puzzled about 'the Lord'): 'They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up with wings like eagles. They shall run and not be weary; walk and not faint.'

The Lord? More natural to me are images of the flowing Source - the Wellsprings - the Waters of Life that Ishwara/Shiva holds in the old Balinese temple carving we stood in front of today. The sacred text of Chapter 6 of the Tao de Ching also holds a nature-reverencing promise whose beautiful blessing I often wait upon for those in my prayers:

The Spirit of the Valley never dies It is the root of all heaven and earth The mother of the ten thousand things

Flowing far away It returns

Frail, frail it is, hardly existing But touch it — It will never run dry

We in WILPF [Women's International League for Peace and Freedom] have been so enriched by all the gifts she has given us so graciously across the years, directly, through Chorus and what we have created together, which is part of the wonder of our two intertwined organisations or are they better called sisterhoods? I remember with great joy in the early days when Joanna said "Chorus is the singing arm of WILPF"
